Check in begins at 8:30 a.m. Program begins promptly at 9:00 a.m.


Location #1: Thomas F. Eagleton U.S. Courthouse

Location #2: The Gateway Arch

Program adjourns at 4:30 p.m. from - Location #2: The Gateway Arch



For adults not staying all day, Scouts can be dropped off at Location #1: Thomas F. Eagleton U.S. Courthouse.

However, Scouts will only be released into the care of an adult when dismissed from Location #2: The Gateway Arch. At the end of Chestnut, just East of 4th Street, there is a small pick-up lane to the right, on the same side of the street as the Arch. Please pull in and wait for your Scout to be dismissed into your care. PLEASE BE ON TIME. We will wait on the sidewalk for 15 minutes. If you arrive later than 4:45 pm, you will need to park on your own and enter the building for pick up. You are always welcome to park and enter the Arch visitor's center to pick up a few minutes before 4:30. We will be on the Mezzanine level just inside the security entrance.



If your family would like to stay and ride the tram to the top, purchasing tickets in advance is highly recommended. See: https://www.gatewayarch.com/plan-your-visit/

<u>All day parking:</u> Recommended parking for those staying all day is at **Stadium East Parking Garage (closer to the Arch)** at 200 S. Broadway, 63102, OR **Stadium West Parking Garage (closer to the U.S. Courthouse)** at 215 S. Eighth, 63102. The Early Bird parking special is \$7. MUST enter between 5-9 am, AND exit between 2-6 pm. If you don't meet these parameters (i.e. if you stay later at the Arch), you could get charged up to \$20 max for the day.

Public transportation: The "Stadium" Metrolink station is located just east of Stadium West garage described above.

Security Entrance: Everyone will need to go through security at **both locations**.

- Activity (Class B) uniforms are the appropriate dress for the day.
- Cameras are not allowed, nor are the usual restricted items like weapons, scissors, pepper spray, etc.
- Adults will need their driver's license or other legal photo ID with them.
- All Scout cell phones will need to be **TURNED ALL THE WAY OFF**. **Scouts are not to use their phones or have them out at all during the program.** Adults should leave their phones set to silent/vibrate.

A note to adults staying all day:

Thank you for agreeing to stay for the program. I will ask for your assistance throughout the day to do head counts, collect and distribute materials. If your plans change, please let me know RIGHT AWAY if you are unable to attend the program. Many thanks.

I must have a final list of all adults for planning purposes. Thank you in advance.

Scouts are expected to bring the following:


- Optional, a small umbrella if rain is expected
- A pencil (pencils only please, NO PENS)
- Citizenship in the Nation Merit Badge Pamphlet (optional, pictured)
- Signed Merit Badge Card (see next page)
- Signed Photo Agreement (see page 4)
- Completed Pre-Requisite Assignments (see pages 5-9)
- A lunch, labeled with first and last name. Because lunches need to go through the security screening, do not pack metal forks, knives, etc.
 - O ALL SNACKS AND LUNCHES SHOULD BE **NUT-FREE**.
 - Scouts should also pack a water bottle.
 - Snack and beverage machines are NOT available. There is no lunch break during which participants can leave the group. All participants must bring a lunch.

Earning the Merit Badge:

Simply attending this event does not guarantee that you will earn the merit badge. Each Scout must meet all requirements as they are stated. Some of the requirements will need to be completed in advance and turned in on the day of the workshop or emailed in advance.

One or more of the instructors has been certified as a Citizenship in the Nation Merit Badge Counselor and will sign off on the Merit Badge Card. Each Scout must bring a Merit Badge Card that has been signed by the Scoutmaster. Have Scout name and all other information already filled out. The card will be collected at check in. The Merit Badge Counselor will sign off only for requirements successfully completed.

If any requirements are incomplete after participation in this workshop, it will be up to the Scout to contact a Merit Badge Counselor on their own to finish any requirements not completed before or during this workshop.



Each Scout should do the following, in advance of the workshop:

- Obtain the Citizenship in the Nation Merit Badge Pamphlet (optional, pictured).
- Read over all of the requirements for Citizenship in the Nation.
- Use the pages 5-9 of this handout to complete requirements 5, 6, and 8 in advance.
 - PLEASE NOTE: You may answer on my worksheets or on your own paper, but please use the format I have outlined on pages 5-9 of this handout. DO NOT use any worksheets available from other sources on the internet.
- Bring all of your work with you to the workshop. Or, you may email your
 work to me in advance (preferred). This is greatly appreciated whenever possible. Parent/Guardian/Scout
 Leader must be the sender of the email or be copied on the email. Scouts should NOT email me without
 including an adult.
- We will complete requirements 1, 2, 3, 4, and 7 at the workshop.

Successful completion of everything listed above will fulfill all Citizenship in the Nation Merit Badge requirements. Simply attending the workshop does not guarantee that you will earn the merit badge.



- <u>Print or Online:</u> Examples U.S. section of Newsweek or Wall Street Journal News, Nation-World section of St. Louis Post Dispatch;
